The law or doctrine of Successful Congregational Life

Churches, like people, are the healthiest when they reach out to others rather than worry about themselves. Churches grow when they <u>intentionally</u> reach out.

So, what do we need to do to get results? Start with the four building blocks of growth.

The 4 Building Blocks of Growth:

- 1. Ministry must be Christ-centered to meet the needs of people, not institutions.
- 2. Worship is the initial building block of congregational life, sustained and nurtured by Christian education.
- 3. God wants the church to grow. Lay people need to learn they are best served when they serve those not yet a part of the Christian faith.
- 4. God expects our very best. <u>Good strategic planning</u>, theology, and business practices are essential.

As we start the basic preparations for our 50th anniversary celebration, it is a time we need to remember and practice the basics of congregational life. In the process of helping others, two things happen: churches develop physical, mental and spiritual <u>health</u>; and they grow numerically. Life works this way for the church and the individual.





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How to protect Smart Phones & Tablets Security Advice from Bob Cromwell

Simple Protection for Smart Phones & Tablets -

Set up a strong PIN for identifying yourself when you talk to your provider. There is a form of attack where the criminals transfer your phone to a different provider. That's the first step in taking over your number, so they can convince your bank that they are you. The attack is called a "port-out" scam or "SIM swapping." Contact your provider and say you want to increase the security on your account. Check out specific carrier advice for protection. Some, like Sprint, don't have much useful information on-line:

Set up as long of a PIN as you can, making it a random number that has nothing to do with your bank PIN or other authenticators. Use a password manager to generate and remember this for you. You shouldn't need to use it very often.

Set up a screen lock. A PIN is best. Turn this on in the *Settings* menu on either Android or iPhone. Unless you are meticulous about cleaning your screen and replacing the screen protector frequently, someone can easily see how to unlock your phone by holding it up to the light. Face recognition sounds fantastic, but so far it's only so-so in performance. It has significant error rates, both false reject (locking you out of your own phone) and false accept (allowing access to someone else because they're "close enough").

Protect Your Files -

Patching, or applying updates, protects your computer – the operating system and programs. Now, we need to protect the data, your personal files and pictures.

"Crypto-locker" attacks are common. Some take the form of "scareware" or "extortionware." Generally speaking, the exploit goes like this: the user wanders into a bad corner of the Internet using an unpatched browser. Remember how I told you to update everything earlier? They were enticed to look at the page through some clickbait about a funny video, or something amazing or outrageous or tempting, or, quite often, promises of porn. The malicious page may have actually contained a funny video, or a cute animal, or an embarrassed cheerleader, or naked people, but it also included some malware that took over their unpatched browser or video player.

This malware then encrypts or deletes all their data.

There goes every picture of every video and every file they have. All of their work. Every priceless picture and video and messages from loved ones. All they have left is a message in somewhat broken English claiming that if they pay from a few hundred to a few thousand dollars to some account in far eastern Europe, they may be able to get their pictures or videos and messages and work back again. The "scareware" or "extortionware" version adds the twists of claiming that national law enforcement has "seized" the computer for illegal activity.

If they had simple backups, this would only be a minor annoyance. And if they kept their system up-to-date, it shouldn't have happened at all.


The critical detail here is to keep your backups off-line. Don't leave it on an external disk connected to your PC. The crypto-locker malware immediately encrypts or deletes everything that it can find.

Smart Phone & Tablet Protection cont...

I keep duplicate copies of important data (pictures, work documents) on my desktop and laptop. When I get back from a trip, maybe to the coffeeshop or maybe to another state or country, I copy all the new files from my laptop to my desktop. Then I copy everything to an external disk every 6 to 12 months.

It is cheap and easy to use an external disk and a fireproof box.

There are a lot of cloud storage services for backup. These are more complicated.

Don't rely on free cloud storage offered by your Internet service provider. That might work out just fine. But, there are many examples of companies that offered free or extremely cheap online storage, and then took it away with very little notice.

Also note that Windows has an easy interface for backing up data.

Seven Habits of Highly Effective Churches

1 Strive for excellence in service to Christ.

Effective churches are churches where people enjoy what they're doing & do it well. Give God your best whether in the care of church grounds, the soup you prepare for the homeless, or the hymns & anthems you sing in worship.

2 Cultivate a spirit of innovation & experimentation.

Make the "seven last words of the church," – that is, "We've never done it that way before" – a distant memory. Be open to new ideas that advance your mission.

3 Take the initiative to build relationships with people & groups in the wider community beyond your congregation.

Refuse to be isolated. Take to the streets, the coffee shops, libraries and parks of your community. Be curious about what's going on. Get involved in community events & meet people. Introduce yourself as a member of the church. Invite people to "come and see."

4 Accept responsibility for mistakes, learn from them, and in all things let grace abound.

Christian's aren't perfect; they are forgiven. Making mistakes is not the worst thing that can happen. In the end, and in the beginning, it is about God's grace.

5 "Always be prepared to give an account of the hope that is within you." (1 Peter 3:15)

Look for where the love, energy and life are flowing and focus on that. Recognize excuses for what they are; a sign of insufficient commitment. Be people of hope, trusting in God to find a way even when we can't.

6 Be willing to let people go in order to stay focused on your core mission.

It is more important for your church to be clear & steady about its core mission than it is to make everyone happy. When folks are unhappy, connect, talk & pray with them.

7 Splash it on!

A hospice nurse told the story of bringing an elderly woman home for the final days of her life. Noticing a large bottle of perfume on the woman's dresser, the nurse asked, "Would you like me to dab a bit of that behind your ears?" "Honey," said the woman to the nurse, "why don't you just splash it on?" God loves cheerful givers, So spend money wisely, well, and freely in God's cause.
