

In August 2017, our country saw a disturbing manifestation of antisemitism at the "Unite the Right" rally in Charlottesville, Virginia, where hundreds of marchers made Nazi salutes, waved swastika flags, shouted "Seig Heil" and "Jews will not replace us!"

The specific hatred of Jews; however, preceded the modern era and the coining of the term antisemitism. Among the most common manifestations of antisemitism throughout history were pogroms; violent riots launched against Jews and frequently encouraged by government authorities. Pogroms were often incited by false rumors that Jews used the blood of Christian children for ritual purposes.

Pogrom is a Russian word meaning "to wreak havoc, to demolish violently." Historically, the term refers to violent attacks by local non-Jewish populations on Jews in the Russian Empire. The first incident to be labeled a pogrom is believed to be anti-Jewish rioting at Odessa in 1821. As a descriptive term, "pogrom" came into common usage with extensive anti-Jewish riots which swept the southern and western provinces of the Russian Empire in 1881-1884, following the assassination of Tsar Alexander II.

In 1879, German journalist Wilhelm Marr originated the term antisemitism, denoting the hatred of Jews, and also hatred of various liberal, cosmopolitan, and international political trends of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries often associated with Jews. The attacks focused on civil rights, constitutional democracy, free trade, socialism, finance, capitalism and pacifism.

Antisemitism added a political dimension to their ideology of hatred. In the last third of the nineteenth century, antisemitic political parties were formed in Germany, France, and Austria.

The Nazi Part, founded in 1919 and led by Adolf Hitler, gave political expression to theories of racism. In part, the Nazi Party gained popularity by disseminating anti-Jewish propaganda. Millions bought Hitler's book Mein Kampf (My Struggle), which called for the removal of Jews from Germany.



The Book of Discipline (edited for brevity)



Expense Vouchers

Approved and initiated by the finance committee, the purpose of the expense vouchers is to have specific people be able to sign off on certain expenses. Social Justice Education "The counsel of the Lord stands forever, the thoughts of his heart to all generations." -Psalm 33:11

Social justice is the effort to deal justly with people through the social, economic, and political systems in which they live. A fundamental teaching of the Jewish and Christian traditions is all human beings are made by God and are formed in God's image. Thus, by virtue of creation, all human beings have dignity-not a dignity dependent on social class race, color, sex or national origin, but dignity which is their birthright conferred on them by God.

Because we are created and formed in God's image, human beings share a common nature that transcends differences. This is the basis for the relationship they have to God and one another. The Jewish and Christian traditions teach religious institutions have no meaning or purpose in and of themselves. They exist to remind us of our sacred origin and bond.

Our understanding of human beings and relationships has expanded in this century primarily because of advances made in the social sciences. Human beings, it is argued, are fundamentally social, born into a particular social, economic, and political context. This context affects understandings and relationships. Moreover, human relationships extend well beyond the private or personal realm. Human beings relate to and affect the lives of one another through the intricate web of economic, social and political structures. The social sciences have provided a fuller understanding of the nature of structures and systems, which are more than the individuals they comprise. They have a history that predates individuals. They have goals, objectives, values, and agenda of their own, and have within themselves power to destroy or enhance life. They are the mediators of human dignity. Consequently, the structures and systems themselves, as well

as, the individuals within them must be brought under moral scrutiny.
